APRIL & MAY BOARD MEETING - SHORT SUMMARY BY BILL BLOODWORTH

APRIL: There are 344 total members, 298 full and 46 associate. A three-year membership option will be proposed in May. Possible registration and membership drawings will be discussed further in May as a way of giving back to VKA Members. President Bill McCornack reassigned Treasurer Scott Klingler to fulfill the Executive Director duties vacated by Pearl Gamble's resignation. Director Karl Ginter was assigned the Treasurer duties. The importance of modern equipment shops and vintage buyers knowing VKA tire guidelines was stressed. It was reiterated that the minimum age restriction for duals is 18 years. Promoter options which differ from VKA guidelines need to be clearly identified in the event flyer. Louie Figone will discuss use of the Randy Holt donation with the executor of Randy's estate. West coast promotion efforts were discussed including track fees and the high cost of accommodations in some areas. The possibility of two additional, West Coast, Tier II events was discussed. Coordination efforts for Sandy Hook are going well. The June Mid-Ohio Enduro event is expected to be large. Adkins track improvements are on schedule. Show efforts for the next three events are in place. Coordination of website updates has improved timely posting of event information. New magazine features will include "Ask Bill" (McCornack) and a list of recent new members.

The ending March balance is \$17,779.92 which reflects revenue of \$1,208 and expenses of \$50.

MAY: There are 348 total members, 300 full and 48 associate. An extended 36month membership option was approved with a fee of \$95 for full members and \$30 for accompanying associate members. Concern was voiced regarding the extreme width of some single engine karts. Research is being conducted regarding prior rules and any approved changes would be incorporated in January. Event dates for 2017 are being established and efforts will be made to begin promotion of these events by late this summer. The possibility of having a free VKA membership drawing at each VKA event was mentioned. The combined June – July issue is scheduled to be sent to the printer on Monday 13 June. Two individuals were approved for lifetime VKA membership. These individuals will be identified during a presentation at a future VKA event. Four engines that are missing from some class lists will be included when January updates are published. There was a general discussion regarding recognition of participant achievement when trophies or awards are presented for only first place finishers. The ending April balance is \$16,788.10 which reflects revenue of \$485 and expenses of \$1,476.82.

ASK BILL BY BILL MCCORNACK

I get many questions about setting up karts, engines, etc. Rolf Hill and I thought it would be helpful to have answers for our members. E-mail your vintage karting question to me at <u>bill.mccornack@comcast.net</u>, and we will try to use it in this column. Here is a sample of some questions I have gotten so far:



Q. Why does my cylinder wall accumulate rust between events?

A. Because, when you last shut off the engine it was hot. Evaporation from that heat leaves very little gas/oil to protect the surfaces. To solve this, when the motor cools down start it up for a few seconds and shut it off. The gas/oil will remain inside for protection.

Q. Why does my kart "two wheel" in the turns?

A. (1) Tire pressure is too low. (2) Seat is mounted incorrectly on sidewinders. They should be mounted as far forward as possible, as close to engine as possible and with the back tipped down/back. (3) Change how you are taking the turn; brake before the turn, then accelerate in the turn. (4) Widen the rear track some. Note: Whatever your tire pressure is in front, it will not make your kart "two wheel;" it's the <u>outside rear</u> tire pressure that is critical.

NOTE FROM RICHARD: The author of this article is our friend, Stan Pinta, from Arcadia, CA. He forgot to mention that his father and grandpa were a tag-team in pro-wrestling during the Rick-The-Bruiser, BoBo Brazil and "Leaping" Larry Shayne era.

CONDENSED VERSION OF STAN'S **MEMORIES:** In the late 50's and early 60's, I had come from an era that was explosive and tumultuous ... the Cold War ... however, my lifestyle as a young boy was in fact very carefree, fun and frolicking. There wasn't the factor of worriment. It was just the lifestyle for a young, curious boy. All you had to worry about was going to school and being associated with your friends. It was a lifestyle that was educational and full of new challenges. A lifestyle that helped a young boy grow into a young man.

We spent hours watching the older boys working on their '57 Chevy, Bel Air, Ford, Dodge, Chrysler, *etc.* in their driveways and front lawns; preparing them for a special event.

My Dad was quite the skilled craftsman. He made many things for the house; from wooden toys, salad bowls, tables and toys to a barbeque and a treehouse. Dad was an extremely handy working man who prided himself on his diligence and quality. Not only did he work on the docks at Union Oil 76, but had a part-time job at the hardware store. He also went to welding school.

In 1958, Dad welded a frame for my first prototype "go kart" with a Briggs & Stratton. That one was not for racing. Next, he researched what was needed for a racing-type go kart. He sought answers from key people from the time. He researched rules and regulations,



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engines and tracks (dirt *vs.* blacktop). The result is pictured above ... with me, as a 10-year old, in the seat.

For me, the period of time from 1965 to 1970 was, without a doubt, a tumultuous period of unrest and confusion. It was the time for the slogan, "make peace and love, not war." A period of time for hatred, a time for compassion, a time (in the beginning) for cheers for those going to Viet Nam and a period of time (later) for divisiveness and "boos" for the, GI returning from Viet Nam.

I grew up in an era when the music was phenomenal. We had Little Richard, Little Anthony and the Imperials, the Platters, Chuck Berry, Martha and the Vandellas, Chubby Checker (and The Twist), Buddy Holly, Elvis, Doo Wop and Rock-n-Roll. This was the age where you would meet the young girl or young lady at the library, malt shop, or movie theater.

I also had quite an appreciation for my Mom. She made a great meat loaf. I remember the summer nights just being with her in the warm evening air of the night; taking in the wonderment of the planets and the stars; just sitting on the porch talking and listening.

She was there for you whether simple things or complicated things. She brought with her a new form for expression and the exchange for ideas. My Mom was half Native American Indian. Α truly extraordinary woman, indeed. Between Mom and Dad, I learned to be myself, love and show compassion to all, to know my place, to always be kind, and to always be of value to others and in turn value will come to you.

United States Navy The and Marine Corps trained me in the arts of military warfare and combat. At Coronado Island, I was trained to be a U.D.T. Navy Seal and for P.B.R. gun boats. An extension of this training was the use of a sextant and compass, underwater explosives, land mines, trip wires and the strategies for survival, which came in handy during my tours in Viet Nam in the Mekong River and tributaries. My service was rewarded with several medals including the Navy Cross and the Silver Star ... awarded by LBJ.

I now work with the V.F.W., veterans, their families and assist Chaplains. *Stan Pinta*

(In his spare time, Stan is a vintage karter.)

Mark D'Elia was 4th running a MC-92 on his Hornet Marauder II Enduro kart. At Roebling Road, the vintage sprint karts are welcome to run with the vintage Enduro karts and Daryl Parks ran his K-78 powered sprint kart in the event.

After the on track events of the day, most of the vintage karters met at Ed Sahagian's shop for an evening of "bench racing". Ed lives only about a mile

from the track so it was easy to meet there. We all threw some money in the pot and bought a bunch of pizzas to share. Ed's wife Michelle ordered the pizzas and before you knew it everybody was enjoying pizza along with their preferred adult beverage and talking about how fast they could have been if this or that had not gone wrong. IN MEMORY OF ...

Ken Burden- Started his karting on a dirt track in Ohio. He in the top three many times in 16 Grand Nationals. At the 1966 IKF Nationals at Quincy, he was interviewed on ABC's Wide World Of Sports and gave an eloquent explanation of the workings of his Lancer kart. His competitive driving style caught the eye of Bob Jeffrey (Big J) who made the Lancer. Ken and Bob loved flying and would load their karts and tools into one or both of their planes and fly to events. Ken was 89.

Gus Traeder- Born on a farm in Rome, WI, Traeder went to work for Montgomery Ward in 1947 and at age 24 became manager in Quincy. Although heavily involved in fast-pitch softball, in 1957 he was introduced to go karts. From that beginning evolved the TNT Raceway, the Miller Grand Prix, Quincy street racing, televised National Championship on ABC, and the premier vintage karting events at TNT. Gus was inducted into the Racing Hall of Fame at Talladega, the Vintage Karting Hall of Fame and the Quincy Chamber of Commerce Hall of Fame in 2013. Gus was 90.

Q. [This is not a question about setting up your kart, but it comes up all the time.] Who is in charge at a VKA "listed event"?

A. The short answer is ... the Promoter/Track Owner. VKA is a promotional/ guideline organization. VKA does not sanction, insure, or run vintage events. VKA's purpose is to keep the history of these old karts/engines correct in their time-periods and to create a standard that can be used at all vintage events across the country. A promoter may ask for advice or assistance from a Board member at the event, but all final decisions are still the Promoter's/Track Owner's. VKA <u>does</u> expect the "listed event" promoters to follow the VKA *Guidelines* (for the most part) for consistency between events. Any deviations should be announced/highlighted in the event flyer for all to see.
